

PERFECT TENSE

1. It's quite common to put "had," "has," or "have" in front of a verb. Let's compare common uses of the past, present, and **present perfect (has, have)** and **past perfect (had)** tenses.
2. Remember, put a "had/has/have" + **o/u** vowel
